Aabid Resort

A stepped highland retreat with layered roofs, sheltered terraces and a valley-facing guest wing.

10 guest keys

Plus a separate 2-bedroom penthouse

Five levels

A stepped hillside programme

Ongoing — design development

Concept imagery and evolving design studies



Arrival elevation · Design visualisation

Let the section follow the hill.

Guest accommodation and terraces step down the hillside. The valley-facing elevation shows how the changing ground level becomes part of the spatial sequence.

Arrive above

A compact arrival connects to the vertical circulation core.

Step through

Public and guest spaces occupy successive levels.

Open to the valley

Terraces and balconies extend the experience toward the landscape.



Valley-facing elevation · Design visualisation

Shelter becomes architecture.

The material brief places monsoon protection, deep roof shadows and durable exterior detailing at the centre of the design.

Roof + rain

Clay roofs, protected eaves and integrated drainage.

Shade + threshold

Verandahs and timber screens create layered transitions.

Ground + water

Stone bases and drained, slip-resistant outdoor surfaces.



Design intent · Performance to be resolved through detailed design

A palette rooted in the highlands.

Concept material direction from the project brief: weathered clay, ivory lime, oiled teak and grey-brown hill stone — the warm, classic highland palette.

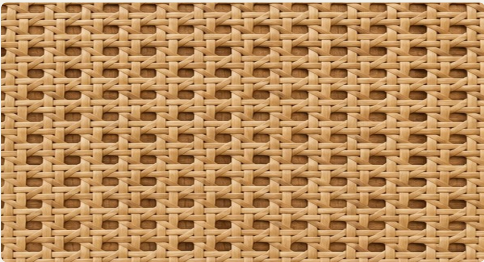

Thanal Cottages

Thanal means “shade” in Malayalam. Low pitched roofs, stone walls and planted gaps give this resort proposal an intimate scale. The path between buildings becomes part of the stay.

Small buildings

A dispersed cottage arrangement.

Shaded thresholds

Covered edges mediate between room and garden.

Landscape as connection

Outdoor paths form the guest sequence.

THANAL / LANDSCAPE + MOVEMENT

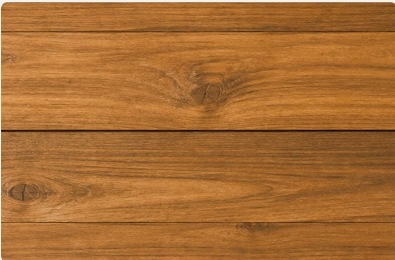

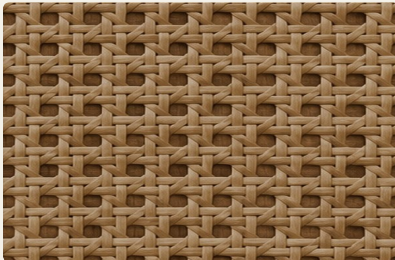

Shila Retreat

Shila means “rock”: a stone-led hillside retreat. This compact proposal brings the guest experience close to the terrain: low volumes, intimate pool terraces and rooms opening toward the landscape.

An intimate scale

A compact ensemble rather than a large hotel block.

Private outdoor edges

Guest spaces extend toward pools and planted terraces.

Roof + ground

Pitched roofs and stone-faced edges frame the hillside setting.



Hillside proposal · Design visualisation

A room. A pool. A view.

Paired pool terraces extend the rooms into the landscape. Stone partitions, planted edges and a continuous clay roof give the smaller resort a clear material identity.

Sheltered rooms

The clay roof frames the guest accommodation.

An outdoor threshold

Each room opens toward its own pool terrace.

A planted hillside

Stone edges and vegetation connect the building to its setting.

A retreat at landscape scale.

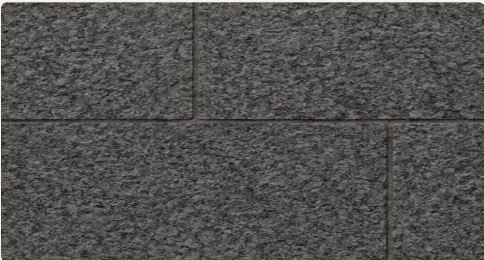

FROM TROPICAL EXPERIENCE TO AN OMAN BRIEF

The expression changes. The methodology remains.

Transfer the discipline of responding to place. Develop the architectural language through the specific Omani site, its climate and its culture.

Tropical design experience

Rain protection; layered roofs; sheltered outdoor space; vegetation; clay, lime, timber and stone.

Jabal Akhdar / proposed lines of inquiry

Altitude and cold nights; intense mountain sun; thermal mass; terraces and falaj water heritage; local stone and lime; sheltered courtyards; drought-tolerant native planting.

A proposed design agenda for Jabal Akhdar, to be tested against the actual site and brief.

Jabal Akhdar: build with the mountain.

High in the Al Hajar mountains, the Green Mountain is defined by terraced gardens, stone villages, falaj water channels and dramatic canyon edges. The site combines level plateau ground with steep terraced slopes, in a climate closer to a mountain retreat than to coastal Oman.

Altitude

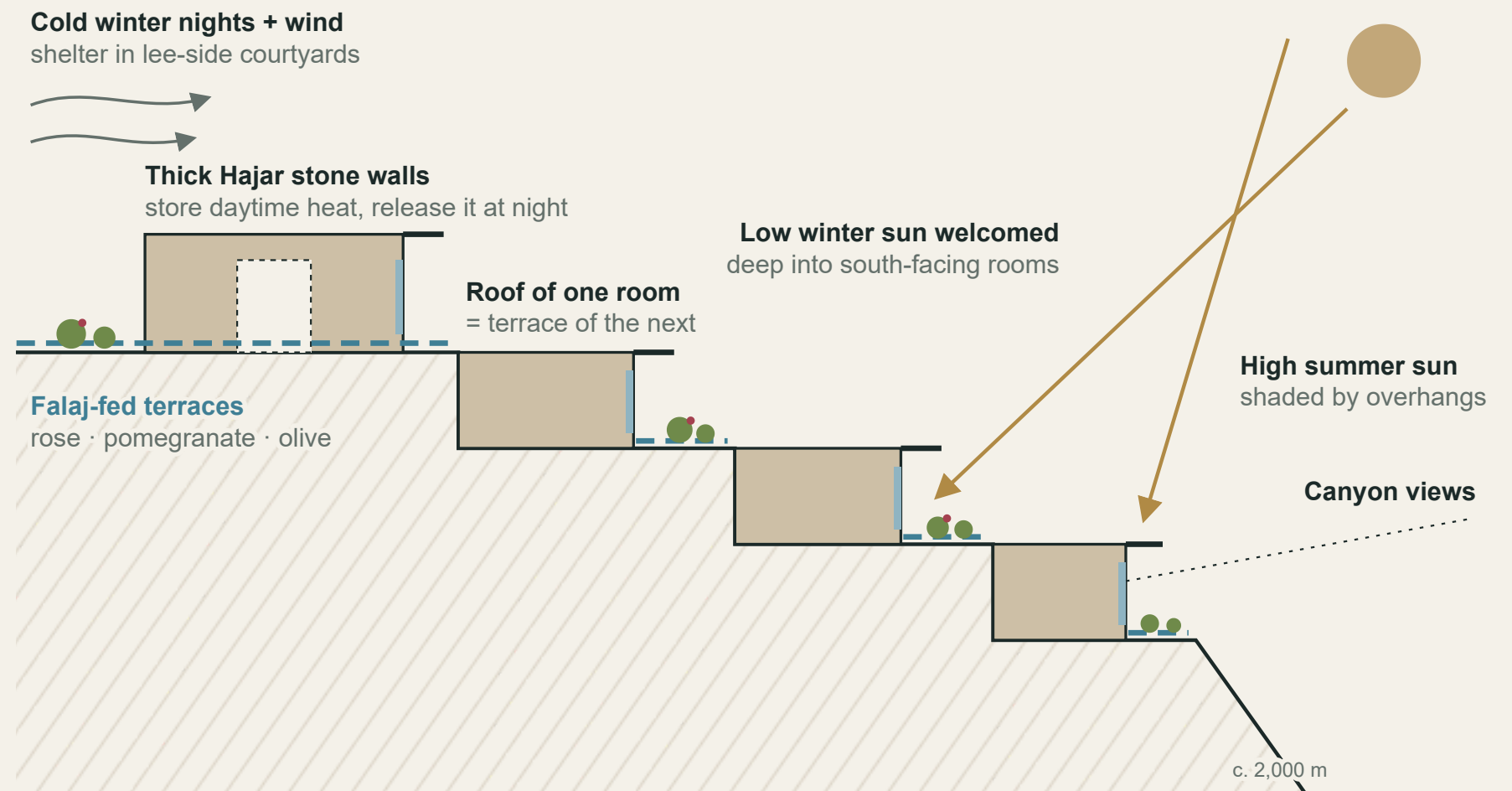
Cool winters, intense sun and a large day–night temperature swing.

Terraces

Centuries-old agricultural terraces set the grain of the land.

Water

Falaj channels and careful water use sustain roses, pomegranates and walnuts.

SURVEY-LED DESIGN

Designed on measured ground.

The site's contour and topographic survey gives the design exact terrain data, so design starts from the ground as it really is, and every decision is tested against measured terrain.

01 / Design on true contours

A contour and topographic survey before the first sketch: terraces, rooms and roads fitted to the real ground, not an assumed slope.

04 / Water paths mapped

Flow lines, wadis and existing falaj channels traced from the survey: siting away from flash floods and smarter water harvesting.

02 / Less cut, fill + retaining

Earthwork volumes calculated from our terrain model, so the layout minimises excavation, retaining walls and cost.

05 / Views tested in 3D

Canyon viewsheds studied on the real terrain, so every room earns its outlook and keeps its privacy.

03 / Flat vs slope, with certainty

The terrain model shows exactly where the plateau ends and the terraces begin, and places each design strategy there.

06 / Survey to site

Heritage terraces and trees recorded and survey-grade set-out for construction, so the measured ground carries through to the built work.

Sun and shade, simulated.

Each scheme is built as a geolocated 3D model on the surveyed terrain, then tested against the real sun path of the site, hour by hour and season by season.

Real sun path

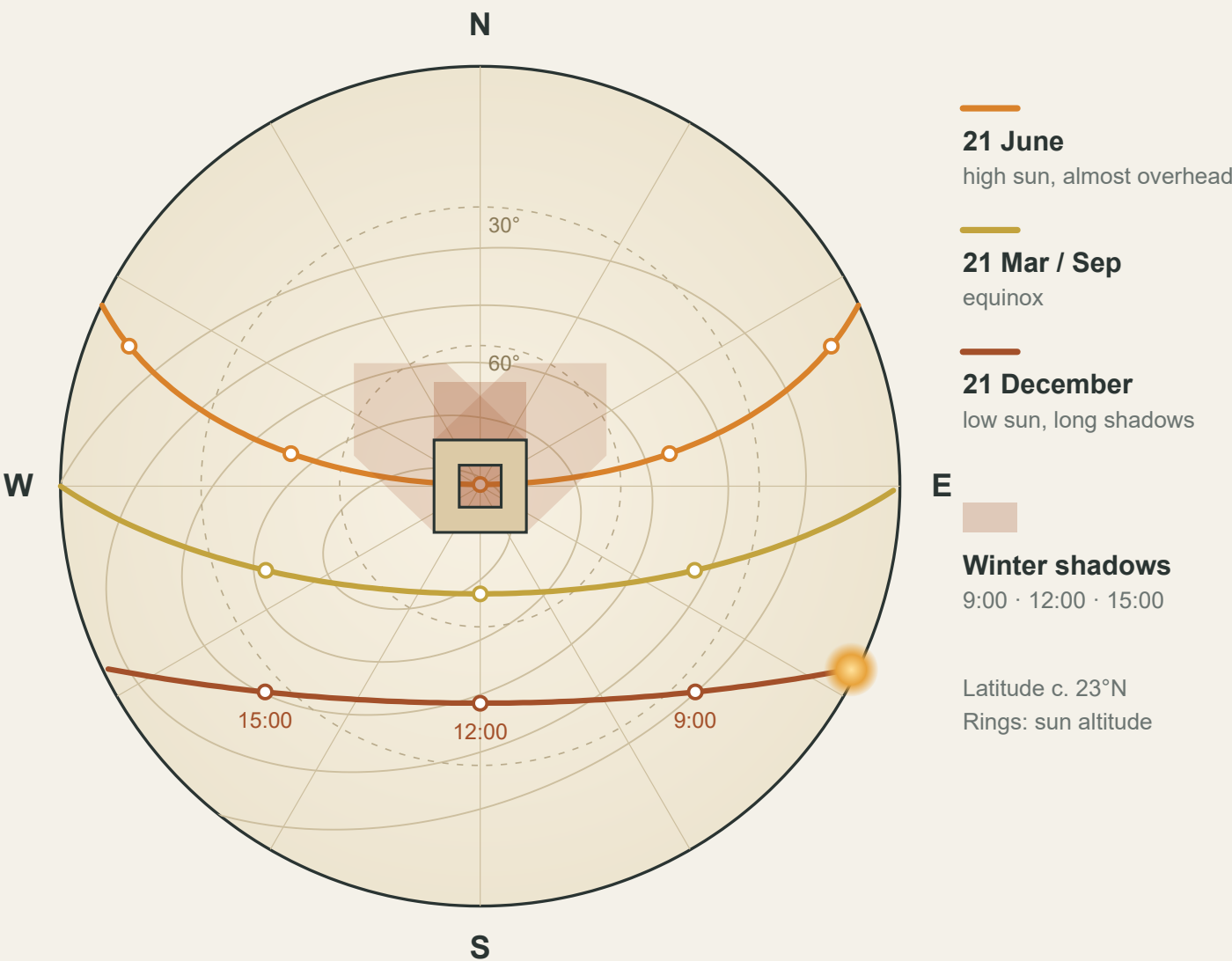
Exact sun positions for the site's location, from the high June sun to the low December sun.

Shadow studies

Shadows from buildings, trees and the surrounding mountains, so courts and terraces get winter sun and summer shade.

Sized to the sun

Overhangs, screens, pergolas and room orientation tuned to the results, not rules of thumb.

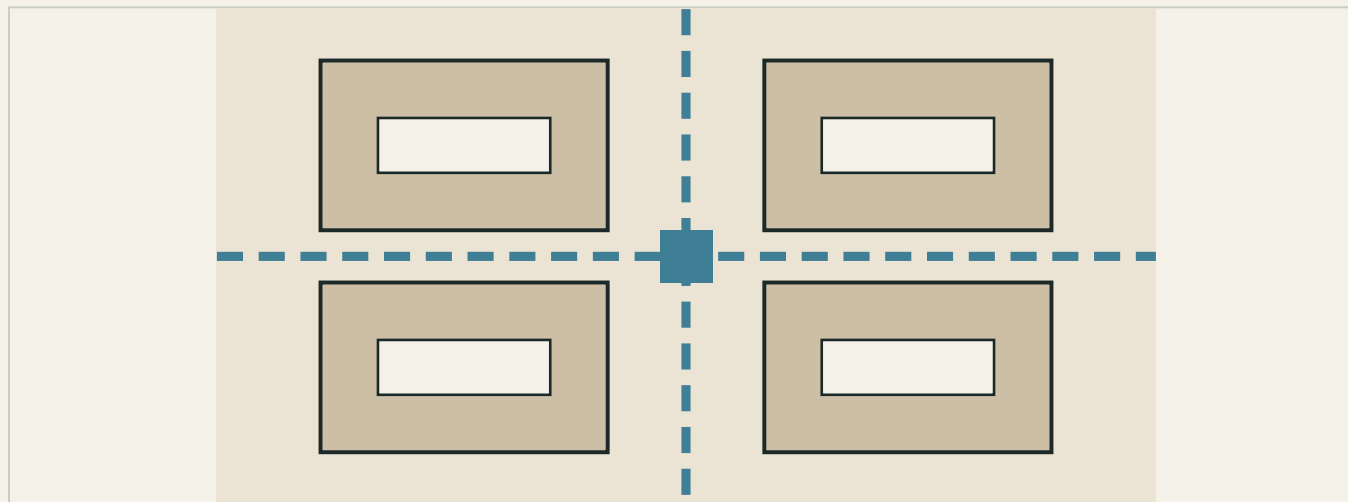


Illustrative sun-path diagram for the site latitude · Final studies run on the geolocated 3D model

Two grounds, two strategies.

The site combines level plateau ground and steep terraced slopes. Each is designed on its own terms, then joined by one landscape of water, stone and planting.

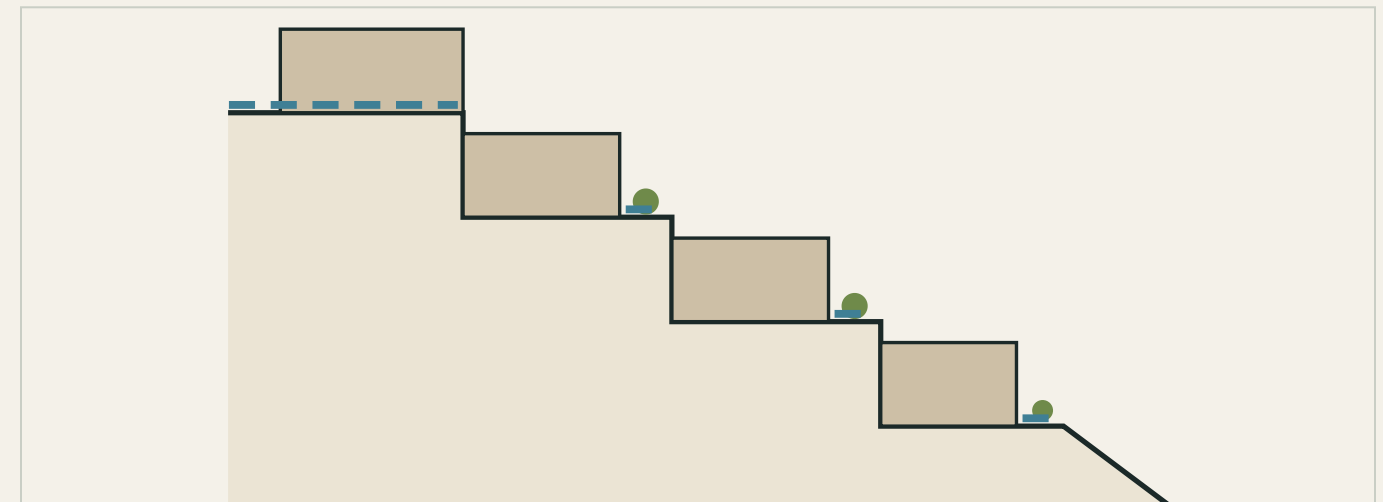
Flat plateau → a courtyard village



- Dense, low courtyard clusters: shelter from wind, sun into the courts
- A falaj rill and shaded lane as the organising spine
- Shared spaces: majlis, spa, rose garden, craft lane, stargazing
- Plateau palette: rammed earth, copper, terracotta, pebble, lattice

Zoning to be fixed by the site's contour and topographic survey.

Sloped terraces → rooms that step



- Rooms follow the contours: the roof of one is the terrace of the next
- Stone retaining walls rebuild the agricultural terraces
- Every room faces the valley and the low winter sun
- Terrace palette: Hajar stone, sarooj lime, earth render, palm, timber

Learning from the mountain villages.

The old stone villages of the mountain already solve its climate. We will study them on site and reinterpret — not imitate — their strategies.

01 / Stepped stone settlements

Houses built into the slope in local stone, clustered for shelter and shade. The resort steps down the terraces the same way.

02 / Covered lanes (sabat)

Shaded passages between buildings become covered guest routes linking the room clusters.

03 / Falaj + terraces

Gravity-fed channels irrigating stepped fields become the landscape spine and water-conscious gardens.

04 / Courtyard + majlis

Inward-looking courts and a welcoming majlis shape the arrival lounge and sheltered room courts.

05 / Beam, palm + earth roofs

Timber or palm-trunk beams, palm-frond matting and an earth layer: an insulated flat roof, reused as a terrace.

06 / Small, deep openings

Thick walls, small windows and carved shutters control sun, wind and privacy; larger glazing only toward protected views.

Vernacular strategies to be documented on site with local builders and community knowledge.

Six moves for Jabal Akhdar.

The same discipline as our tropical work (read the place first) expressed through the mountain's own villages, terraces and climate.

01 / Follow the terraces

Step the plan along the contours: the roof of one room becomes the terrace of the next.

02 / Mass for the extremes

Thick local stone walls, deep reveals and compact volumes buffer strong daytime sun and cold nights.

03 / Welcome winter sun

Orient main rooms south with calculated overhangs: shade in summer, low winter sun deep inside.

04 / Water as heritage

Falaj-inspired channels, rainwater and greywater reuse feed rose, pomegranate and olive terraces.

05 / Village, not block

Cluster rooms along lanes and courtyards like a mountain village, sheltered from cold winds.

06 / Local materials + craft

Stone, lime, earth, palm and timber from the region, built by local masons and craftsmen.

Arrival lane → courtyard majlis → terraced rooms → rose gardens → canyon-edge terrace → rooftop stargazing

Terraces: local stone first.

A palette sourced as close to the site as possible: mountain stone and lime for thermal mass, earth, palm and timber for shade and craft. No pitched clay roof; here the roof becomes a terrace.

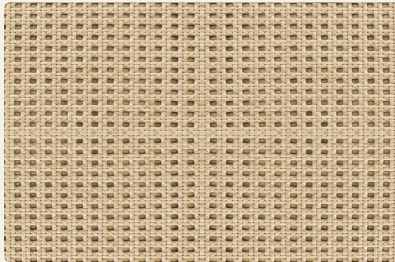

On the flat ground: a village of courts.

Where the land levels out, rooms gather around courtyards along a shaded lane and a falaj rill: dense, sheltered and walkable, like the mountain's old villages.

Shelter

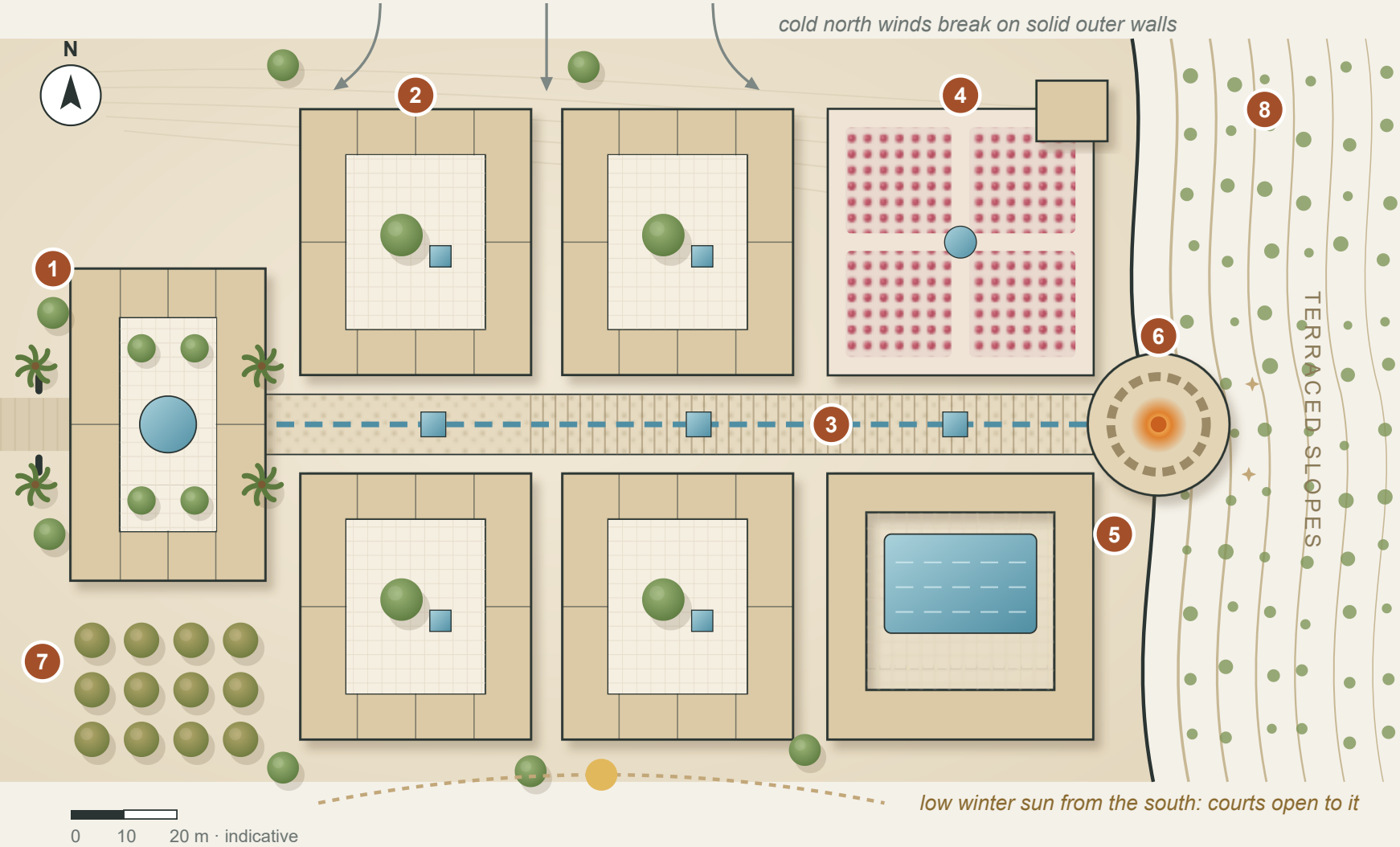
Solid north walls and tight lanes break the cold winds.

Sun

Courtyards open to the south to catch the low winter sun.

Water

A falaj rill links arrival, courts, gardens and spa.

Special spaces on the plateau.

Moments that make the stay specific to the mountain and its traditions.

01 / Arrival majlis court

A shaded courtyard with coffee, dates and rose water: the traditional Omani welcome.

02 / Rose distillery garden

Damask rose beds and a small distilling pavilion where guests join the spring harvest.

03 / Stargazing court

A sunken, wind-sheltered circle with a fire pit at the plateau edge, for clear mountain nights.

04 / Warm-water spa

A heated pool and stone steam rooms for cold evenings, set within thick earth walls.

05 / Craft lane

A covered lane with studios for pottery, copperwork and palm weaving by local artisans.

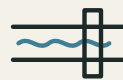
06 / Orchard dining

Long tables under pomegranate and walnut trees, watered by the falaj.

Programme to be developed with the client brief and local community partners.

Small features, lasting character.

Details drawn from Omani craft and climate, repeated across courts, lanes and terraces.



Falaj rills

Narrow stone channels carry water through courts and lanes: sound, cooling and heritage.



Carved doors

Studded, hand-carved timber doors mark each courtyard house.



Sun-warmed benches

Built-in stone benches on south walls hold winter sun for evening conversation.



Lantern niches

Small niches cut into thick walls for lanterns, pottery and rose-water flasks.



Stone lattice

Pierced screens filter low sun and frame views while keeping privacy.



Palm pergolas

Areesh shade over lanes and roof terraces casts dappled light.



Rain spouts

Projecting spouts throw rare rain clear of the walls into planted gravel beds.



Copper lanterns

Pierced copper lights by local metalworkers pattern the courtyard walls at night.

Illustrative details · to be developed with Omani craftsmen.

Plateau materials: earth, metal, craft.

Where long walls are possible on level ground, the palette turns to site earth and Omani crafts: warmer, more tactile and more decorative than the stone terraces.



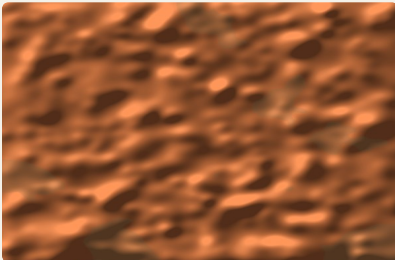

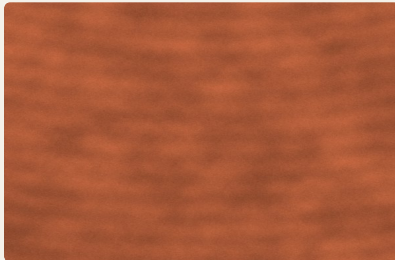

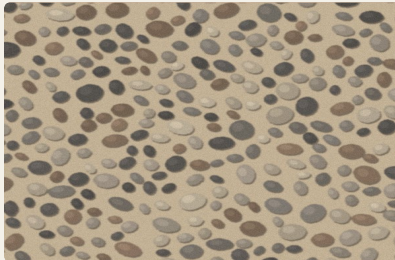

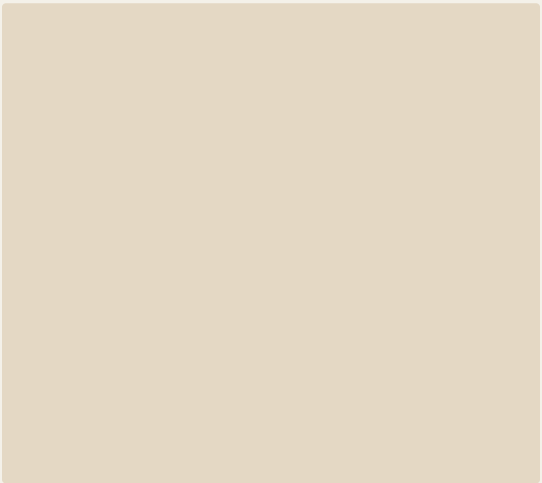

01 / Survey + understand

The site's contour and topographic survey, plus mapping of terraces, slopes, falaj, sun, wind and night temperatures with local knowledge.

02 / Test

Compare terrace layouts, massing, shade, guest routes and local material options against the brief.

03 / Resolve

Coordinate structure and services; develop buildable details; verify local materials through samples and mock-ups with Omani craftsmen.
